Dear Friends,

'... A great gale arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already being swamped. But Jesus was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and the disciples woke him up and said to him, 'Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?' He woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, 'Peace! Be still!' Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. He said to them, 'Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?'

(Mark 4: 35 - 40)

Elsewhere in this edition of the Quarterly there are dramatic photographs of storm damage in Corstorphine caused by ferocious Éowyn, which hit the UK and Ireland on the 24th of January. Storms are no fun; I hope you came through that one unscathed, not everyone did. Natural disasters of all kinds can be very serious. The manse family own a property in the Borders. During the November cold snap, a pipe burst, and the cottage was flooded. Even this harmless 'disaster' has been disruptive, intrusive, and upsetting for us. For others, storms and floods can be much more serious, people fear for their lives.

Storms aren't only real, they are also metaphorical. All sorts of storms buffet and sometimes wreck our lives. Ill-health, a lost job, a broken relationship, a bereavement, or any number of physical and emotional tragedies make us wonder whether the misfortunes we suffer are a feature of our lives or a bug. Are they a part of creation, or a part of creation gone wrong? If they are a bug – something intrusive that can be pulled out – then we might think that we should be able to pray that God will make the storms of life go away. After all, why would God not come to our rescue? On the other hand, if they are an intrinsic part of our fallen world and our fallen lives, prayer may not be as useful.

Jesus encountered misfortune, tragedy, and disaster. From a boat on the sea of Galilee to a garden before his arrest, storms both real and metaphorical often crashed around him. Both in the boat and in the garden, Jesus discovered that the storms he encountered had to be faced rather than wished away out of fear, `...and going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want." (Matthew 26:39)

Jesus taught this lesson to his disciples; faith is praying for the strength to courageously live in this fallen world confronting the storms of suffering, sadness and misfortune that blow through our lives. Cowering in a boat hoping that God will make it all go away is wishful thinking. Praying for faith to face our fears brings us strength from God, which we didn't believe it was possible for us to have. That strength can be accompanied by an unexpected stillness and peace.

Whatever storms you must face this year, I pray that through your faith in God, by the power of Christ's love for you, and with the help of the spirit of holiness found in the love that we in the Christian community have for each other, you will discover the strength and courage that you need to endure, and that you will experience some measure of peace and stillness despite it all.

Some of you may know that I've been missing from church over the past 18 months. During this time, I have been travelling with the non-profit organisation called 'Heart Global'. Heart Global runs workshops in schools and community groups all over the world working with children and adults to teach singing and dancing with the overall aim of boosting self-esteem and improving confidence. Our cast members come from all over the world, giving me the opportunity to make friends and work with people from 14 different countries. I have completed 3 tours, 2 in Japan and 1 travelling Europe and am about to embark on my 4th tour, bringing the cast to the UK and Ireland. At the end of our 3 day workshops the participants and the cast come together to put on a show for family and friends in which they show everything they have learned and even perform solos. It's so amazing to see even the shyest children stand up and sing a song (often in a foreign language to them) or perform a dance for the audience. The philosophy at Heart Global is 'YES AND...' meaning, just go for it and try something new. We are encouraged in our workshops to say yes to trying new things, even if it is something way outside our comfort zone, and we encourage the participants to do the same.



While travelling we also get the opportunity to stay with Host Families who give us accommodation and look after us. The host families often take us on days out around the area and show us what their life is like. This has given me the chance to try so many new things like cycling football, wearing traditional Japanese dress and making real Italian pasta. This is such an amazing way to immerse yourself in the culture and I have made many friends, and learnt so much.

Heart Global was founded in 2020, right before the world went into lockdown, by Bill Brawley and Robyn Brawley. Bill has been working for over 40 years in the industry as an artistic director, and has performed alongside the likes of Bing Crosby and Fred Astaire and worked with Diana Ross and Whitney Houston while directing the Superbowl Halftime Show and FIFA World Cup Closing Ceremonies. Robyn Brawley began her career at the Australian Ballet Company and the Royal Swedish Ballet and has performed with many great classical ballet dancers, and has directed Broadway Concerts with Tony award winning artists. Together they have gathered special guest directors who direct the cast on our tours and change every 2 - 3 weeks. These guest directors also fly in from all over the world and range from Broadway performers to Ballroom dancers, each one there to teach us something new about performing and teaching.

I'm so grateful to everyone I've met and worked alongside while doing this and I can't wait to have the new cast over in Scotland in March!

Fire Evacuation Information

The Fire Warden Team leads: Marion Campbell, Fiona Coutts and Lesley Gulland have updated the Fire Evacuation information for the church. The Church of Scotland ask us to ensure that the congregation is made aware of the fire evacuation plan for the church. Please find this information below

At the sound of the Fire alarm, the Beadle or Fire Team lead will identify where the Fire is and remain at the front of the Sanctuary to manage the evacuation,

When the alarm rings, the Fire wardens in the church will proceed to the Sanctuary Fire exits at the east, west & front doors. The Fire lead and wardens will be wearing **yellow 'hi vis jackets'**,

Fire wardens will direct you to the appropriate exits, depending on the site of the Fire. The safe exit may not be the nearest exit to your seat. Please listen/watch the Fire lead and wardens.

The **primary exit routes** from the Sanctuary in the event of fire are as follows: seated in the centre aisle, leave by the **front doors** to the FRONT meeting point, seated in the choir, the east transept or Beith hall, leave by **east front door** to the FRONT meeting point, seated in the west transept, leave via **west corridor front door** to the FRONT meeting point or **those with mobility issues** via **room 4** to the REAR meeting point,

from room 6, leave via **west corridor front door** to the FRONT meeting point, from the Martin Shields Hall, creche or lounge leave via the **Crush Hall** or **North corridor door** to REAR meeting point, from Burns Hall leave via the **emergency exit door** in the hall, or the **Crush Hall** to REAR meeting point.

The Fire safety meeting points for the church are:

FRONT – on the pavement on St John's Road to the west of the front entrance to the church. Please keep the church entrance free for the Fire Service to gain access,

REAR – on the pavement outside St John's church on St Ninian's Road. Please keep the rear church entrance free for the Fire Service to gain access,

The congregation are asked to leave the Sanctuary as quickly and as calmly as possible, to gather at the front and rear Fire safety meeting points.

If you need additional support, please gather in the west transept wheelchair space, if practical, and await assistance, or speak with a Fire warden. The wardens will help or encourage others to assist if necessary.

Primary children attending Sunday School will exit with their teachers, via the **Crush Hall, or the Burns Hall emergency exit**. Parents leaving from the front of the church should meet their children at the REAR meeting point, via St Ninians Drive and along St Ninians Road.

The Fire warden at the front door of the church, and the Fire warden in the car park will encourage you to move towards the front and rear meeting points respectively.

Please leave the church quickly and calmly, do not return to the church until the Fire wardens instruct you to do so.

The Big Freeze of 1955 (and the Storm of 2025)



Seventy years ago, from early February 1955 and well into March, a Big Freeze took place in Britain. Deep snow and freezing temperatures caused havoc, with many places cut off. The RAF dropped food and medical supplies to affected areas, while thousands of sheep died from exposure.

Although the winters of 1947 and 1963 have attracted more publicity, 1955 saw severe weather in most parts of Britain, as well as in other parts of Europe and North America.

Snow fell in many areas of the UK from 11th February onwards, with night frosts gradually worsening and blizzards developing over the north of Scotland, where the RAF scrambled to do several rescues: in Caithness the response by emergency services was known as Operation Snowdrop. An exhausting search for a postman from Thurso, who went missing in the deep snow, eventually led to his being found at a remote farm where he had sought refuge.

More than 70 roads in Britain were blocked by snow, according to the Automobile Association, and hundreds of vehicles were abandoned in snowdrifts. Many parts of the country were cut off from essential supplies, and rail travel was disrupted. Church attendance was also hit, of course.

This year in Corstorphine we have had our fair share of Winter Weather including a very cold snap at the beginning of January. Then with Storm Eowyn a red weather warning brought the City and activities to a halt just like lockdown. There was even a gridlocked carpark in Tesco the evening before as people prepared for a day inside.

Do you have a favourite Hymn?



Paul Art

As part of my Divinity degree, I recently began a course called 'Paul and His Letters'. For this course I need to make a presentation, to my tutorial group, on an artwork related in some way to the Apostle Paul, his writings, and/or significant themes in his writings. Despite my previous undergraduate degree being in History of Art, I was keen to find something modern for this task, and something with obvious contemporary relevance.

The only written description of Paul is found within a second-century apocryphal text, called "The Acts of Paul and Thecla", here Paul is described as:

"a man small of stature, with a bald head and crooked legs, in a good state of body, with eyebrows meeting and nose somewhat crooked, full of friendliness; for now he appeared like a man, and now he had the face of an angel."

I was reluctant to select from the array of ancient portraits to be found, likely based on this description, and shy too of choosing a well-known classical historical scene, such as one of Raphael's cartoons, in which Paul is featured. Therefore, I was delighted when I discovered this recently commissioned work by Bettina Furnée entitled "I am more like this".



"I am more like this" was created for an exhibition, in May 2023, called Reimagining Paul, seeking to help viewers visualise Paul in new ways, connecting to contemporary themes of identity and asking how we might interpret Paul and his letters today. This lilac and yellow lit neon work displays alternating flashing text over two lines: "like this" and "I am more". The words are an extract from the New International Version translation of 2 Corinthians 11:23, which in its entirety reads:

"Are they servants of Christ? (I am out of my mind to talk like this.) I am more. I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again".

In this verse and the wider passage, Paul boasts of various hardships he has suffered in the course of his ministry. By isolating words from 11:23, and presenting them in flashing neon format, the words can be read as an ambiguous identity statement prompting two questions: 'like what?' and 'more what?'.



The textual nature of this work appealed to me because Paul's legacy is written. I was also struck by the artist's explanation that she was invited to respond to selected passages of Paul's letters that resist ancient and modern expectations regarding masculinity and gender, with Paul alluding to his body as being marked, disabled, enslaved and maternal. As I reflected on this suggestion, and the words included in the artwork, I thought about how limited our understanding of others can be, and how we readily view difference negatively. Yet, "like this I am more" / "I am more like this" reminds us that whatever "this" difference is, it can indeed be something positive, resulting in us being "more", and possibly not something that is measured by orthodox means of success or wealth. I wonder what the words make you think of?
