If you are a visitor to St Ninian's or are reading this magazine for the first time, the following information may be useful:

Our SUNDAY SERVICES are held at 10:30am and are followed by fellowship with tea and coffee in the Martin Shields Hall.

COMMUNION SERVICES are at 10:30am and 3:00pm on the first Sundays in March, June, September and December.

During term time PRIMARY SUNDAY SCHOOL is held every Sunday and SECONDARY SUNDAY SCHOOL meets two-weekly, both at 10.25am. A CRÊCHE is available for pre-school youngsters.

The CHOIR leads the Praise under the direction of our Organist, Anne Kirkpatrick, and choir practices are on Thursday evenings from September to May.

The GUILD meets weekly on Tuesday afternoons between September and April, with interesting speakers, teas, and outings.

Volunteer drivers offer a CHURCH TRANSPORT SERVICE for our less able members - see the back page for contact details. Reserved car parking is also available at the rear of the church for anyone who cannot walk far or who prefers to avoid steps - access to the church is by the path to the right of the buildings.

Many Church and non-Church organisations use our premises throughout the week and contact details can be found on the back page.

Dear friends,

"When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you ... and you say, 'I will set a king over me, like all the nations that are around me', you may indeed set over you a king whom the Lord your God will choose. One of your own community you may set as king over you...".

(Deuteronomy 17: 15)



by the time you read this, St. Ninian's will have marked the coronation of King Charles III on 6th May with a service and a lunch on Sunday 7th May (see over page for photographs). The service was an opportunity to celebrate a new figurehead - a sovereign - who represents us as a nation, and who plays a part in the governance of our nation.

Monarchy has a long history. The Bible records that the Israelites appointed kings to serve over them. Those kings represented the nation and played a significant role in its governance. However, the king was not meant to be a focal point for the nation's identity. That role was reserved for God and his Law. Consequently, there is a lot of ambivalence in the Bible about monarchy because the Israelites recognised the dangers of entrusting so much power in the hands of one human being, "... he must not acquire many horses for himself, or return the people to Egypt in order to acquire more horses... And he must not acquire many wives for himself, or else his heart will turn away; also silver and gold he must not acquire in great quantity for himself." (Deut. 17: 16 - 17)

This ambivalence gives rise to a heated debate in the Bible about whether the nation should be a monarchy ruled by kings or a theocracy ruled directly by God through priests. Ideally, the monarch should be God-fearing, "When he has taken the throne of his kingdom, he shall have a copy of this law written for him in the presence of the levitical priests. It shall remain with him and he shall read in it all the days of his life..." (Deut. 17: 18).

Today, as Christians, we have a faith in the love of God to govern our lives through the sovereignty of Jesus Christ over all earthly power, and through the community of Holy Spirit over all earthly communities. But we are not just Christians, we are also British, and as such we need a sovereign to represent us as a nation and to personify who we believe ourselves to be as a nation. We are fortunate that this dual allegiance is probably easier for us to reconcile than it might be for other faiths; the coronation will have a distinctly Christian identity. Nevertheless, as British Christians we can pray and hope that King Charles will not only represent the breadth of culture and identity that makes up modern Britain, but that he will be guided by, observant of, and an advocate for the law of love; love of God, of neighbour, and of ourselves, which Jesus Christ gave us as a new commandment to live by.

A modern, multi-cultural Britain that respects its traditional past is alive to the debates about what it is in the present, and that hopes for a prosperous future for all its subjects in a Christian Britain guided by a loving self-respect, loving relationships with our neighbours around the world, and a love for the God who created us all, and under whose sovereignty we all have an equal place, share in an equal dignity, and have a right to expect equal opportunities.

God save King Charles III who, we pray, will serve us and God in love and, as his mother did before him, model how we too can love God, our neighbours and ourselves.

Presbytery plan update

The presbytery mission plan, in which it was proposed that a three-way union between St Andrew's, St Anne's and ourselves be progressed and that all our buildings be retained for more than five years, was agreed at a Presbytery meeting in November last year, albeit the resources allocated to the new union are inadequate to progress the union at the moment.

However, when the Presbytery plan was submitted for approval by the national Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group (PMPIG) and the General Trustees, Presbytery was informed that; "in the view of General Trustees the number of buildings proposed for retention in the Corstorphine area was noticeably higher than in other areas of the Presbytery or when compared to areas in other Presbyteries. Therefore, rationalisation of Church buildings is necessary in Corstorphine".

This has the effect of putting the whole of the presbytery mission plan on hold and forced the Presbytery to revisit the building classifications in Corstorphine. After much discussion and correspondence, it was agreed with all the parishes in Corstorphine and the Presbytery Deployment Group (who are drawing up the plan) that all buildings in the Corstorphine parishes would be recategorised as "B". This building category means that the building can be disposed of

within five years. An amended Presbytery Mission Plan containing this change was agreed at the Presbytery meeting on 25th April, thus allowing the whole of the Presbytery plan to be sanctioned by the PMPIG.

The Presbytery Deployment Group (PDG) has advised that a decision must be made before 31st December 2024 on which buildings would be released for disposal by 31st December 2025. In the meantime, the proposed three-way union between ourselves, St Anne's and St Andrew's and the two-way union between Craigsbank and Corstorphine Old will continue.

However, I would reiterate that no property disposals can take place without the agreement of the congregation and the Minster. Similarly, no progress can be made towards the proposed three-way union until the issue of allocated resources is resolved and the agreement of the ministers is achieved.

We have raised several questions with the PDG and are awaiting their reply. Further discussions are planned with the PDG and with all five parishes involved to determine the future of the Church buildings in Corstorphine within the timetable above.

ST. NINIAN'S DEACONS' COURT

The Deacons' Court of St. Ninian's was established by St. Ninian's Free Church in 1844, one hundred and seventy-nine years ago. It has had a long history, has taken on many responsibilities, and played a significant role in the worship and community life of this church. It's first task of major undertaking was to build a church. When members of the congregation left what is now Corstorphine Old Parish Church to establish Corstorphine Free Church they established a congregation without a building and called a minister without a manse. Since then, the Deacons' Court has built on to the original church and added halls.

From the start of St. Ninian's history, the Deacons' Court not only built, but it also counted; it had to manage the congregation's money. Over the years, the Deacons' Court has had the responsibility of raising money for the congregation's needs and investing it responsibly in the work of ministry and mission. In more recent years the Deacons' Court has taken responsibility for the employment of staff and the management of the commercial lets of St. Ninian's halls. Most recently, the Deacons' Court took responsibility for St. Ninian's response to the pandemic.

The responsible stewardship of these temporal matters - buildings, money, staff, crises - has allowed the Kirk Session and the minister to pursue the responsible management of the congregation's spiritual matters, things like worship, pastoral care, mission, and Christian education. Without the temporal foundation that the Deacons' Court laid and built on over the past 179 years, it is difficult to see how St. Ninian's could have flourished spiritually as much as has it has done. In 2023, the Deacons' Court leaves to the newly constituted Kirk Session sound finances and well-maintained property, and we can hope that there will be more years of ministry and mission to come.

None of this would have been possible without the work of individual deacons who, over the years, have volunteered their time, their skills, and their commitment to the Court. Just some of those Deacons who have served this congregation over these 179 years met on the 22nd of February for the last time as a Deacons' Court. When they did, they imagined that they we are not alone, but were joined with those who had gone before them and who served the cause of the Gospel, the work of the church, and the wellbeing of St. Ninian's through their membership of the Deacons' Court; some still with them on earth, others above them in heaven. Wherever they were, on behalf of St. Ninian's (and I'm certain along with those ministers who have gone before me and have served as moderators of the Deacons' Court over the years) let me say thank you to all the deacons over the years for all their work, their time and their talents that they have all brought to the Deacons' Court over the years.

"Gracious God, thank you for all those men and women who have served on the Deacons' Court of St. Ninian's over the years: for the time they have given; the skills they have brought; the love they have had for the congregation, and their enthusiasm for the work of your church. Thank you for their witness to you that has provided a sure foundation for the proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ in this part of Corstorphine. Bless, we pray, the ongoing work of St. Ninian's in its new constitution. Help those who have served the Deacons' Court most recently to find a new place in a new structure within a long-established church. We remember those who have gone before us while we look forward to giving to those who will come after us an inheritance that they in their turn can cherish and build upon. Amen."



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Fabric Committee

Our annual Property Reports were approved by Presbytery in March.

Car access in and out of the car park is difficult due to cars parking in St Ninian's Road. With the help of a local councillor the white lines at the entrance will be extended to provide wider access and better sight lines.

The Presbytery inspectors called for straightening of the leaded window in the Deacons' Room which had a sag at the bottom due to old age. Yes, many can sympathise with this condition!

Following reports of Church lighting being left on and doors being left unlocked we have placed signs at all the external doors as a reminder for the last person leaving the premises.

Work has continued at the Manse over the last few months. Slating has been renewed over the first floor Study. The Bathroom ceiling has been re-lined and a stronger extract fan installed. The Kitchen walls have been treated and repainted. All the external wall cracks have been drilled, reinforced and filled and we are pleased to report that no deep structural cracks were found.

An unusual problem occurred in April when a pigeon entered the Burns Hall roof vent and got trapped behind the suspended ceiling tiles. It was eventually released and chased out through the fire exit door. Grilles are being manufactured to prevent any future incursions.




Your gifts this Christian Aid Week will help farmers in Malawi to plant better seeds, secure a fairer price for their crops, and build happier futures for their children.

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

News from Corstorphine Community Council

1) CORSTORPHINE CONNECTIONS UPDATE (LOW TRAFFIC NEIGHBOURHOOD - LTN)

The next phase of the implementation has been further delayed and is now likely to be May 2023

The artistic commission is almost finalised and new gates for Corstorphine Primary and Carrick Knowe Primary will be produced by blacksmiths with installation planned over the summer.

Following correspondence from residents and discussion with Living Streets, Spokes and local Councillors, a short section of protected cycleway on Ladywell Road will be removed to improve sightlines for pedestrians crossing the road near Ladywell Medical Centre. Parking will be retained.

3) COUNCILLOR REPORTS

Cllr Scott Arthur (Transport and Environment Committee Convenor) gave a presentation entitled 'Transport Transitions' which gave an overview of the opportunities, aspirations and challenges being faced to improve air quality, reduce congestion and meet net zero 2030 targets. Ultimately looking to reduce the number of vehicles being driven into the city and encourage a switch to public transport or active travel where possible. The movement of goods/freight is also being looked at to improve the situation for businesses and HGV/Commercial traffic. The Air Quality Action Plan, Public Transport Action Plan, Active Travel Action Plan and Road Safety Action Plan will all go out to consultation at the same time.

Cllr Beal noted that transport is the main issue that he is contacted about, with potholes and pavement defects consistently being raised. Cllr Arthur advised that he believed that a sum of approximately £7-8 million is required across the city to stop the decline.

Cllr Beal is on the board for Transport for Edinburgh. He has been dealing with correspondence re Corstorphine Connections. The request for traffic lights at the end of Pinkhill Road was refused. Flooding in Corstorphine is being referred. (cont'd)

The council is consulting on whether to retain the Spaces for People measures on Meadow Place Road and Queensferry Road. The details on how to contribute to the consultation are here https://www.edinburgh.gov.uk/downloads/file/32266/advert. The deadline for comments is the 20th May.

4) PLANNING APPLICATIONS

A representative from Mactaggart & Mickel, who are developing the site of the former Woolworths and Community Centre on St John's Road, will be in attendance at the April meeting of the Community Council. Of note are the removal of affordable housing units and changes to parking allocation from original plans.

5) OTHER

Following the closure of the Post Office within RS McColl on St John's Road, the opportunity to run a Post Office on St John's Road is being advertised on the Post Office website. 

50 Years Ago, 1973, from the Quarterly, April 1973

From Minister's Notes, by the Rev Colin R Martin

"In the month of May this year St Ninian's will celebrate its 130th Birthday. In 1843 a group of 36 people met in a schoolroom just to the east of the present church building for what was virtually the inaugural Service of Worship of the congregation of St Ninian's Church (though clearly it was not known by that name until the Union of 1929). One wonders what those founder members thought would be the future of their little village Free Kirk. Such fantastic changes have taken place in community and church over these 130 years. Numerically speaking we are now the fourth largest charge in Edinburgh, and the activities of the congregation might reasonably be described as wide-ranging. . . We in Corstorphine are privileged to live in an area where the majority of people still claim a church connection. We have 2,000 members on our Roll. Surely then one of our missionary tasks is to 'the lost sheep of Israel, - our own wanderers and sluggards and waverers.

What a tremendous Birthday Present it would be, if every member who does regularly worship brought one member who doesn't back to Worship Services - if every member of an organisation brought one new member - if the children who are not encouraged to come to Sunday School were encouraged. We would have a worse accommodation problem than ever - and it would be the happiest problem we could hope and pray for! . . ."

COMMENT

As at 30th April, there is a deficit on the General Fund of £10,228 which is a decrease of £11,621 on the position for the same period in 2022. The difference can be explained as follows:

Higher Income = Increase in surplus of £1,783

- There were increases in Hall income £6,374, Bank Interest and Investment Income £80 and Other Receipts £3,480. These increases were offset by reductions in Offerings £8,003 and donations £148.
- The increase in Other Receipts was mostly due to a Listed Places of Worship claim which allows us to recover VAT paid on specific types of expenditure on church buildings. The claim amounted to £2,925
- The decrease in Offerings was due to timing and some larger donations made in 2022.

<u>Higher Costs = Reduction in surplus of £13,404</u>

- Costs increased in most areas except Giving to Grow contributions, Presbytery dues and Office Admin costs.
- The main areas of increase were: Fabric expenditure £12,837 due to structural work carried out on the manse roof and external walls; Premises running costs £2,438 due to lower gas payments in 2022 as a result of a billing error and the inclusion of cleaning costs in 2023 which were previously reported under Salaries.

Taking account of legacies received the decrease on the position as at 2022 is £25,835.
